Zeta Zeta is making progress by leaps and bounds. We are very proud to announce the election of former high alpha, Jon Brooks '02, to the position of IFC president for the 2001 calendar year. Our congratulations also go out to our current high epsilon, James Pennington '02, for his appointment as the 2001 vice president of programming for the IFC as well. Good luck to these gentlemen and to all of our members involved with IFC.

We are even more excited to announce the success of our recruitment efforts over the past year. Last semester, we initiated 15 new members, eight of whom are currently officers or hold positions on officer committees. This semester, we have 11 new associate members, more than double the largest spring class in the previous five years. This brings our total recruitment for the year to a phenomenal 26 men, leaving Zeta Zeta with 1,384 members after this semester's initiation. Our goal of having 1,400 initiated members by the end of the 2001 calendar year is clearly within reach.

Zeta Zeta is striving in other areas as well. At the conclusion of the fall semester, Zeta Zeta earned the 24th-highest GPA in the Greek community, up from 42nd at the conclusion of last spring. We have improved our relations with the general fraternity greatly over the past couple of months and are working with them continuously to resolve past problems such as membership recognition and financial delinquency. Our goal is to be in completely good standing by the middle of next semester.
