

Alumni House Corporation Remaining Vigilant, Providing Forward-Thinking Action and Planning

Newly Formed Alumni Review and Control Boards Clean House

The past year had more than its normal share of challenges for the Alumni House Corporation. As officers and directors of our alumni network, we know that every year poses old and new situations that must be dealt with. To their credit, the brothers serving with me have such an extensive track record, that not much comes as a surprise. Most times, we are busy trying to keep ahead of the influence that Father Time has on our 80- plus-year-old house.

Funding from our alumni and rent from the active chapter keep us current with the mortgage, taxes, and insurance; and it leaves us a small working capital account with which we can take care of one bigger project or a few small projects each summer. But larger projects (i.e, the chimneys, roof, and boiler), which certainly will need repair in the not too distant future, continue to be a source of concern as to where will we get the funds when needed. Another frustrating item is the slow retirement of the existing mortgage.

None of this is news, but it is the environment in which we work each year. Then we have a year like 2005-2006: once again we found the active chapter to be operating in a manner inconsistent with proper procedures. That's where past experiences provided us with the knowledge and tools to quickly and effectively fix the situation. Briefly, the active chapter membership had grown to over 100. They had many "hangers on," and the environment was more like a social club than the fraternity that most of us joined. Care for the house was non-existent, damages mounted, and the so-called active leaders would or could do nothing to correct the situation.

After getting approval from the general fraternity, we mapped out a game plan for improvement. The first step was the formation of an Alumni Control Board (ACB), which took control of chapter operations. To begin with, an Alumni Review Board (ARB) was formed and in February all active members were required to appear for an interview to

determine if they should remain brothers. Some did not even appear for their interview; they were removed immediately.

Of the actives who did interview, about 20% were found lacking enough in attitude and commitment for expulsion. In all, more than 30 members on the active roster were removed.

Next, the ACB moved active elections to coincide with the normal school year. Most of the previous active officers did not even run for their prior office or a new one. The active brothers elected an almost completely new High Zeta, which was approved by the ACB.

These new officers are primarily underclassmen, but what they lack in experience is more than recouped in their earnest desire to do the right thing and take care of the chapter. I am pleased and optimistic as we enter the new year.

It sure has been a long year. A few of us have spent an enormous amount of time and energy fixing a situation that could have been crippling had it persisted. But opportunity and crisis are often linked, and the opportunity that we have now should start to bear fruit soon.

We achieved a lot during the alumni work weekend in August. Much more could have been done if we had more guys show up, though. Special thanks to the active brothers that worked with us on many of the cleaning and painting projects.

What's needed right now is more alumni participation. Whether it's fixing up the house, having a reunion, or just reconnecting old ties-the more we interact, the better! We've been here now for nearly 100 years. Isn't there a little window of time over the course of your next year that you can set aside for Zeta Zeta?

The fall homecoming weekend events are detailed in this mailing. They begin with the fall House Corp. meeting at the chapter house (9 a.m. if regular kick-off, 10 a.m. if 3:30 game). A good start would be to see many of you at the meeting; I hope we will.

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
very grateful that we are being recognized for our hard work during the school year.

Remembering a Great Lambda Chi

Lt. Col. George Jovanovich, Jr., Z903 April 24, 1955 – March 9, 2006

It doesn't seem that long ago that we were standing in the chapter room with the rest of our new pledge class (we definitely weren't "associates!"). "What the hell have we gotten ourselves into?" was a phrase that rattled around inside our heads. Little did we know what lay ahead of us, how quickly time would pass, and how we would soon have to deal with life's issues far, far removed from the wonderful bubble that was Zeta Zeta and Penn State.

We were a disparate bunch – a couple of 'burghers, a couple of Philly guys and a couple of small town guys from somewhere in the middle. But in a short period of time - as has been repeated thousands of times at Lambda Chi Alpha - we grew close, we stuck together, we helped each other out, and somehow, amazingly made it into the brotherhood.

One of those guys was of medium build with long, light brown hair and an uncanny resemblance to "CW" from the popular

movie "Bonnie and Clyde". So in typical ZZ fashion, brother George Jovanovich was bequeathed a nickname he would have the rest of his life. CW was a business major, but in his heart he loved the theater, and took it upon himself to indoctrinate us, along with the rest of the chapter whenever possible, to the world of show tunes, opera, and classical music. He was quite convinced that anyone who didn't share his love of theatre and the arts was heathen. And I don't think any of us could ever bring ourselves to tell him that his late-night choice of music was often a real buzz kill. Because we loved the guy, and we were brothers.

CW had a typical '70s kind of laid-back attitude, but his razor sharp mind, quick wit, unbelievably great sense of humor, and commitment to brotherhood at Lambda Chi Alpha are his real legacy. He was always the first to volunteer, whether it meant helping with the ritual, cleaning the kitchen or finishing the keg! And let this be

testament to his amazing partying prowess! If there was ever a brother more fun to be around, well, we've never met him.

After graduation, CW tried the corporate track for a few years, but realized that his real love (besides Phyllis) was flying. He dedicated himself to a career in the United States Air Force, and was an accomplished navigator with the 434th Operations Group at Grissom Air Force base in Kokomo, IN. He was assigned as a navigator on the KC-135 Stratotanker, and flew missions in operations Enduring Freedom, Noble Eagle, Desert Shield, and Desert Storm. His list of medals, honors and awards is as long as his list of friends. Yet somehow, after thousands of successful missions in combat conditions, CW died after hitting a patch of ice on his way home to his wife and sons last March.

It has been our distinct pleasure to spend an indelible part of our lives with him. May the echoes of his favorite phrase ring through the halls of Zeta Zeta forever: "Drink up Shriners!"
