STEPHEN AHRENS '84

Miracle of friendship

Don't you hate taking a detour? Sometimes, though, we have to take a detour to arrive where we should be in life. **Stephen Ahrens '84** knows this fact well as a result of his journey to Penn State.

"I was raised in Yardley, Pennsylvania, a suburb of Philadelphia in Bucks County," he said, "the youngest of four kids. Yardley is on the Delaware River, three miles south of Washington Crossing, which has been a spot on most maps since Christmas, 1776." Stephen graduated high school in 1980.

"My college career began at Kutztown State College," Stephen recalled. "I wasn't academically a strong student and Penn State referred me to a branch campus for my freshman year. This had no appeal to me, so I enrolled at KSC and transferred to Penn State for my junior and senior years. I was initiated in my sophomore year, Spring of 1982, at Kutztown.

"I joined Lambda Chi because the resident assistant on my freshmen floor at Kutztown was the rush chairman. He got me interested and I was initiated in Spring of my sophomore year in May, 1982."

After transferring to Penn State, a trip to the library led Stephen to join the chapter. "During my junior year, I had on a Lambda Chi sweatshirt. Scott Alderfer '86 saw me in the library and invited me out to the house," he said. "Mugsy was the President. I became active, paid my dues, and the rest is history."

Stephen lived in East Halls during his junior year and in the fraternity house for his senior year. "I only lived in the house for one year but was the house manager during that time. I wanted to contribute and nobody wanted the position, so it became mine," he recalled. "I have an older brother who was a Phi Kappa Psi at Indiana University and he, too, was the house manager. He encouraged me that it was a good way to be very involved with everyday life of the fraternity and he was right."

Remember the RA from earlier in the story? "He was a couple years ahead of me and, ironically, he enrolled at PSU in a graduate program," Stephen explained, "and he would stop into the house every so often during my senior year, so it was a small world."

Stephen graduated from Penn State in 1984 with a degree in finance. He married his wife, Nancy, in 1989. The two live in Richmond, Virginia. "Nancy and I have three kids: Elizabeth 29, Ben 27, and Daniel 24. Everyone is out of the house and on their own, doing well, and paying taxes."

Stephen got right to work upon graduation and built a successful career. "I owned a small trucking company with 50 trucks and 100 employees that was part of the transportation network for the United States Postal Service," he said. "Most people don't know it, but that is how mail moves across the country - through independent contractors.

"I sold my ownership to my partner in 2016 and have been retired since then. I never rejoined the workforce after the sale and have some regrets about that since I felt like I had some 'gas left in the tank."

Stephen reflected on the way the fraternity helped him form relationships since college. "Lambda Chi has been good for me," he said. "After graduation, I ended up renting a house in Yardley with **Kevin Murphy '82** and **Tom Gasbarre '82**. We rented for several years and, through them and our annual pig roast, I met a whole new group of fraternity brothers.

"Now that I'm retired and have more free time," he continued, "I've reconnected with

I would like to see more brothers who have graduated get current with their alumni dues. It's not hard. Pay it back and you will get it back in spades. It'll be money well-spent."

He also had advice for the undergraduate members of the chapter. "I'd like to see the undergrads reinstitute sitdown dinners," he suggested. "Dinner was more than just a meal; a lot of camaraderie occurred during that 30 minutes."

Indeed, camaraderie looms large in Stephen's thoughts about the fraternity experience. "I believe the overall biggest benefit of Lambda Chi Alpha is friendship," he said. "Lambda Chi provides the framework for the miracle of friendship to happen and the benefits can last a lifetime."

Jeff Cucchi '94 followed in his brother's footsteps into Lambda Chi Alpha, a bigger brotherhood that had a lasting impact.

"I was initially attracted to Lambda Chi because of my older brother, Vinny Citarelli '91, who joined Lambda Chi during his sophomore year. He introduced me to many of the brothers while I was attending another university. The brothers were so welcoming and open to me, even though I was not a PSU student. After I had transferred and attended University Park, it was a no-brainer for me to rush and become a part of the brotherhood."

Jeff joined the chapter at a time when significant changes were occurring in the fraternity and across campus. "At the time, Lambda Chi was going through a transition and we were the leaders in changing the 'pledge' process. We were also making the hard decision to become more responsible with alcohol during social events," Jeff explained.

"The national office made the decision to outlaw kegs in all of the houses. This was a big challenge for our house during this time, as other fraternities were not changing with the times. We successfully navigated these challenges and grew our membership over the two years I was a brother."

Jeff believes this is due to the lessons passed on by the fraternity. "The core values that Lambda Chi taught me are ingrained in my everyday life," he said. "Loyalty, duty, respect, service and stewardship, honor, integrity, and personal courage are all traits that I continue to pursue in my life today. When life starts to get hard, I focus and embrace those words and they help in the roller coaster that is life.

"Fraternities today are very different than they were 30 years ago," Jeff said. "The world changes around us and we

need to adapt to those changes. During my time at the house, we faced a challenge of maintaining recruitment when mostly all other houses could do social events very differently.

"Today, liability issues, social media, and university scrutiny are all major concerns for active members. The house can no longer be just a social place. The members need to be focused on creating bonds and relationships beyond the parties and football games," he said.

"They need to know why the relationships they establish are important to their future as leaders in this world. They must trust that the brothers with whom they share the chapter room today will be the men sitting next to them through all their life's challenges," Jeff explained, emphasizing the effect Lambda Chi had on him as a person.

"Lambda Chi impacted my life immensely," he said, "as the relationships I built during my time in the house have continued to this very day. I am still in communication with many of my brothers. They were there for my wedding, my son's birth, and for the loss of a few of our brothers over the years."

Jeff recalled some other life lessons he learned through the fraternity: "Without Lambda Chi Alpha, I would not have been as successful as a husband, father, community, and business leader. Everything I learned during my time at Lambda Chi has shaped me to be who I am at this moment in my life."

In addition to the more weighty life lessons, Jeff also reflected back on festive occasions. "One of my most fond memories at the house was Homecoming 1992," Jeff explained. "I had never seen a group of men work so hard for one goal as much as I saw that year. It was such a pleasure to see brothers working with associate members as well as the sorority to put together a great float and, I believe at the time, earned a third place finish! There was such a sense of brotherhood during that week, where all the members helped and supported each other."


