AN IMPORTANT UPDATE ON ZETA ZETA

The alumni of Zeta Zeta, represented and led by our alumni corporation board, always strives to ensure the enduring legacy and success of our chapter. Over the last few months, some difficult decisions have had to be made in the face of significant challenges with the chapter.

How We Got Here and Actions to Date

During the final week of the spring semester, the General Fraternity (national) placed the undergraduate chapter on limited operations. The General Fraternity then conducted an investigation, which revealed significant operational deficiencies. As a result of these findings, national ordered and organized a membership review and the installation of a control board led by Ken Termini (see Ken's message on the next page). The control board is committed to guiding the chapter back to its foundational principles.

All returning undergraduate members were required to meet with the membership-review committee. The purpose of these interviews was to assess each brother's understanding of the issues, their commitment to upholding the value of Lambda Chi Alpha, and their willingness to actively participate in the chapter's revitalization. That review is now complete, and Zeta Zeta now has a strong nucleus of 29 active undergraduates.

The House

The timing of these events posed a challenge. Once a person signs a residential lease, Pennsylvania law makes it very difficult to remove that individual from a property. There was not enough time to conduct the investigation and complete the membership review prior to issuing a lease. We wanted to avoid offering suspended or expelled members housing contracts, as they could have then refused to vacate the property. Therefore, the alumni housing corporation made the difficult but necessary decision to not issue a residential lease to the chapter.

What's Next

While the house will not serve as a residence for the undergraduates, the chapter will remain active and vibrant, and the house will be used for certain group functions, such as undergraduate officer meetings and rush. Ken Termini will also serve as the new undergraduate adviser. The General Fraternity, control board, and undergraduates, will work together to ensure appropriate guidance and training is given/received, and that the operational deficiencies are corrected.

We expect the undergraduates will work through these challenges and come back better than ever, continuing our more than one-hundred-year legacy.

We will provide further updates as the chapter progresses, and we welcome your continued support and engagement during this crucial period.

As Mike Heimowitz reported in his chapter update, it's been a tough 100 days. Investigations, membership reviews, suspensions, and expulsions, have occupied a lot of time and burned a lot of energy. It has not been fun.

During the past few years our undergraduates increased their focus on Penn State-centric items like THON, high membership numbers, and a perceived popularity and prestige within the PSU Greek community. Simultaneously, they deemphasized teaching Lambda Chi Alpha's core values via our history, lessons, and ritual. This trend accelerated over the past school year, and ultimately led to the breakdown of chapter operations, and a fractured relationship between the undergraduates and other key stakeholders.

The good news is these problems were identified, and corrective action has begun. I wish I was taking on this role under better circumstances, but it doesn't diminish my enthusiasm and excitement about becoming the adviser for our beloved chapter. We have a small, but solid, group of young men who are ready to get Zeta Chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha back on track. They, like I, are ready to embrace this opportunity.

Sharing common culture, teachings, and beliefs, is what make us Lambda Chi Alphas. Those bonds build the foundation that allow all brothers to relate to each other, regardless of age, race, religion, or location. Unless those common experiences are part of every member's experience, the house at 351 E. Fairmont isn't Zeta Chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha, it's a generic frat that serves as little more than a social club.

It's time to reestablish and proudly display our pride in being Lambda Chi Alphas. AXA is unique in the Greek world. All members are equal. We do not have pledges.
